Cost-Share Awards for Projects on Private Property



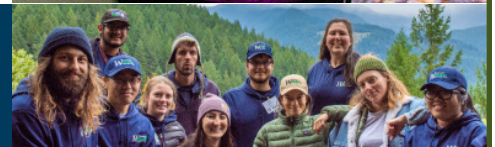
