RESOLUTION NO. 09-006

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE KING CONSERVATION DISTRICT ADOPTING THE 2010-2014 ASSESSMENT APPROPRIATION PLAN AND THE ASSESSMENT APPROPRIATIONS BUDGET 2010 .

WHEREAS, the King Conservation District ("District") is a governmental subdivision of the State of Washington, organized under Chapter 89.08 RCW with the purpose and authority to protect and conserve natural resources throughout King County, except within the boundaries of the incorporated cities of Enumclaw, Federal Way, Milton, Pacific, and Skykomish, which are not located within or a part of the District; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to RCW 89.08.400, the Metropolitan King County Council ("Council") is authorized to impose special assessments on certain lands within the District for a period or periods each not to exceed ten years in duration to finance the District's activities and programs to conserve natural resources; and

WHEREAS, in connection with the District's proposed system of assessment for the period 2010 through 2014 which the District intends to submit to the Council for approval before August 1, 2009, the District has prepared an Assessment Appropriation Plan for 2010-2014 ("Plan"), which identifies and describes the District's conservation activities and programs that it intends to fund using the proposed system of assessments; and

WHEREAS, although the County has the authority under RCW 89.08.400 to accept, or modify and accept, the District's proposed system of assessments, the District has the sole authority to establish and approve the District's Plan and associated annual work plans and budgets or other spending plans; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to RCW 89.08.400 the Council will consider the District's Plan in the process of reviewing and approving the District's proposed system of assessments for the period from 2010 through 2014 in order to determine whether the public interest will be served by the imposition of the special assessments and that the special assessments to be imposed on any land will not exceed the special benefit that the land receives or will receive from the District's conservation programs and activities; and

WHEREAS, the District desires to formally adopt its Plan, which includes an assessment appropriation budget or spending plan for the conservation activities and programs described therein;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of the King Conservation District as follows:

Adoption of Assessment Appropriation Plan 2010-2014. The Assessment Appropriation Plan 2010-2014 attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference is approved and adopted by the District. A copy of the District's approved Assessment Appropriation Plan 2010-2014 shall be provided to the Council along with the District's proposed system of assessments for the period from 2010 through 2014.

Assessment Appropriation Plan

Proposed System of Assessments (2010 -2014)

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

RCW 89.08.400¹ defines the process and requirements for a conservation district and the legislative authority of the county in which the conservation operates to authorize special assessments to finance the activities of a conservation district.

On December 12, 2006, the King County Council approved KC Ordinance No. 15661, which authorized the current assessment for three (3) years at the rate of \$10 per parcel (rounded for the ease of reference), effective January 1, 2007, through December 31, 2009.

The King Conservation District ("District") submits a proposal for a system of assessments that, if approved by the King County Council, would become effective January 1, 2010, and would continue through December 31, 2014.

The District prepared this Assessment Appropriation Plan ("the Plan") following six (6) public comment sessions held throughout the district between May 14, 2009 and June 2, 2009. Public comment was received until July 27, 2009. The District also engaged the Conservation District's Advisory Committee for comment and advice on the Plan through meetings held on June 30, 2009, and July 21, 2009. The District Board of Supervisors also held Public Hearings on the System of Assessments on July 13, 2009 and on July 27, 2009 at its regularly scheduled board meetings.

The funds received from an approved special assessment for calendar year 2010 will be utilized for District approved programs and services for the benefit of lands situated within the boundaries of the District pursuant to RCW 89.08.220. District programs and services will be focused on the accomplishment of the District's mission, vision, and strategic goals; which will be focused in three priority area: (1) *Engaging Landowners to Achieve Community Based Stewardship*, (2) *Improve the Sustainability of Working Lands*, and to (3) *Extending the District Mission through Strategic Partnerships*.

For the proposed 2010-2014 assessment period, the District has provided an innovative structure to its presentation of proposed budget appropriations, and has a fully integrated program budget for all District programs. This new presentation of District programs and services will provide for more transparency around the use of all assessment funds.

All special assessment collections remitted to the District during calendar year 2010 will be utilized consistent with the Plan outlined in the sections that follow.

INTRODUCTION

In preparation of the District's Assessment Appropriation Plan for the proposed system of assessment for the period 2010 - 2014, the District Board of Supervisors focused first on the District's Mission, Vision, Values and Strategic Goals as the framework for the programs and services that the District provides. Establishing secure and reliable funding for the District and building the capacity to deliver effective services are strategic goals of the District, the achievement of which are an integral purpose of this Plan.

KING CONSERVATION DISTRICT MISSION, VISION, AND VALUES.

The King Conservation District, as a special purpose district, created pursuant to Chapter 89.08 RCW, is guided by the mission and mandate of that legislation, which directs the general mission and purpose of conservation districts, which includes direction to conserve, protect, improve and maintain, "renewable natural resources," which include: *land, air, water, vegetation, fish, wildlife, wild rivers, wilderness, natural beauty, scenery and open space*. RCW 89.08.020. The focus of conservation districts is to work with and through landowners and managers to achieve conservation outcomes that are ecologically and economically sustainable. For the King Conservation District this includes special emphasis on conservation in the altered and developed environment, which exists in King County. In addition to its legislative mandate, the King Conservation District receives guidance from the Washington State Conservation Commission, and as one of 47 conservation districts in Washington State, is cooperatively engaged in statewide efforts to conserve renewable natural resources.

Consistent with the Conservation Districts Law (Chapter 89.08 RCW), the King Conservation District has established its own specific mission, vision, and statement of its values, which reflects the unique needs of the District's constituents; and to guide and govern the programs, services, and projects that the District delivers.

Mission: "To promote the sustainable uses of natural resources through responsible stewardship"

Vision: "King Conservation District will be recognized as a leader in achieving community based stewardship of lands within the District, with economically and environmentally sustainable working lands, vibrant agriculture, and technically sound land, water, and habitat stewardship embraced by all citizens."

Values:

- Service
- Respect
- Cooperation
- Responsibility
- Effectiveness
- Accountability
- Transparency

The District's mission, vision, and values provide the framework for the District's strategic goals, which the District's Board of Supervisors have adopted to guide the programs, services, and other activities of the District in order to create a government agency that is transparent, effective, and accountable to the citizens that it serves. Above all, in all of its programs, services, and projects, the District is essentially in the "people business" since all of the conservation and natural resource improvements that the District accomplishes is with and through the people the District works with.

KING CONSERVATION DISTRICT STRATEGIC GOALS

In setting the long term direction of the King Conservation District, the District's Board of Supervisors engaged in a process of clarifying the mission, vision, and values of the King Conservation District into clear and achievable strategic goals.² These strategic goals provide the framework for the District's programs, services, and priority areas. The purpose of these strategic goals is to focus the resources of the district to create and deliver the most value and benefit to the residents and citizens of the District, and provide a framework for evaluating existing and future programs, services, and projects.

- *Strategic Goal 1: (SG1) Empower landowners to sustainably manage the natural resources on their land and effectively engage them to implement conservation best management practices throughout the King Conservation District (including rural, suburban, and urban environments).*
- *Strategic Goal 2: (SG2): Significantly increase the implementation of best management practices and conservation projects throughout the King Conservation District (including rural, suburban, and urban environments).*
- *Strategic Goal 3: (SG3) Significantly improve the sustainability of working lands within the boundaries of the King Conservation District.*

- *Strategic Goal 4: (SG4) Extend the mission of the King Conservation District through effective strategic partnerships.*
- *Strategic Goal 5: (SG5) Effectively engage in conservation policy development in order to remove barriers to the long term implementation of sustainable conservation practices on land within the District.*
- *Strategic Goal 6: (SG6) Significantly build the organizational capacity of the King Conservation District in order to effectively accomplish its mission, goals, and objectives.*
- *Strategic Goal 7: (SG7) Establish secure and sustainable funding to accomplish Mission of King Conservation District.*

PRIORITY AREAS FOR ASSESSMENT FUNDING

Introduction.

The District will use assessment funds to achieve the District's mission and its Strategic Goals. These goals are focused into three priority areas, for which assessment funds will be utilized. These priority areas take the District's mission and focus its activities on the core competencies of the District, and extend that mission through the effective use of strategic partnerships to leverage the competencies of the District. A focus on working lands, specifically agriculture continues to be an ongoing commitment of the District, even as its programs and services continue to reach beyond its traditional rural roots and meet the needs of urban and suburban landowners.

Priority One (P1): Engaging Landowners to Achieve Community Based Stewardship.

The District will utilize assessment funding for programs and services that achieve Community Based Stewardship. The District's core mission and competency is the engagement of private landowners and managers in the effective stewardship of renewable natural resources under their control. Working with landowners to become cooperators in conservation is what the District has done for 60 years.

The core programs of the District involve education, site specific planning, and implementation of natural resource management practices. Education that raises the awareness of natural resource issues and conservation needs, site specific planning that engages landowners in a personal understanding and commitment to the conservation needs of their land, and resources and tools to implement conservation on the ground, are all important parts of engaging landowners. The District plays a unique role as a non-regulatory government agency; the District achieves its outcomes through technical skills and a trusted relationship with landowners. It is this trusted relationship that is the foundation for lasting change.

Education. District programs and services that focus on education and community engagement include *adult education workshops* related to topics of water quality, soil conservation, nutrient management, marine shoreline and other habitats. These programs educate landowners on natural resource management issues, and District programs and services that address those issues. Farm tours and other demonstration site workshops provide opportunities for community members to see by example effective implementation of conservation practices in action. These demonstration sites and education programs regularly involve existing District cooperators voluntarily donating time and space for these programs; further committing them to conservation.

Natural Resource Conservation Planning. At the core of community based stewardship is individual landowner engagement and conservation. Site specific planning is the first step in the implementation of natural resource conservation practices that protect and enhance water quality, improve fish and wildlife habitat, reduce stormwater runoff, and control noxious weeds. Planning involves specific services to dairy operations as well as other agricultural operations to assist with improvements to sustainable production, assistance with meeting local regulations and associated permitting requirements, as well as providing assistance to landowners and agricultural operations referred to the District by local or state regulatory authorities. The District continues to play a vital role in providing conservation planning services that provide opportunities for landowners to receive permitting fee reductions and the easing of regulatory restrictions. Site specific resource planning also lays out the roadmap for implementation of conservation best practices and conservation projects.

Technical Assistance Services. The District provides technical assistance services to landowners and land managers implementing natural resource management practices. District technical assistance services include site specific assessment, planning and implementation assistance on water quality protection and enhancement, soil conservation and fish and wildlife habitat protection and enhancement. These services also may include ongoing support to individuals implementing natural resource management plans developed by the District.

Implementation. The District will continue to turn plans into action; by achieving conservation implementation with cooperators and other partners. Implementation of conservation practices and best management practices happen in a number of ways, by landowner cooperators themselves as well as projects and actions taken in cooperation with the District. The District also engages in a number of conservation projects, managed directly by the District.

Priority Two (P2): Improve the Sustainability of Working Lands.

The District will utilize assessment funds to provide programs and services directed to enhance the sustainability of working lands within the boundaries of the District. These programs and services will support all aspects of sustainability: ecological, economic, and human, all of which are required for long-term conservation efforts to last. For the District, working lands include those lands contemplated by RCW 89.08.020, as lands including renewable natural resources, which include agricultural lands, rural forest lands, and other lands utilized in connection with renewable natural resources.

District programs and services are designed to support sustainable local agriculture within the District, through direct producer assistance, support services, and through partnerships with other organizations and agencies with a focus on sustainable agriculture. Programs and services related to this priority area include supporting direct marketing of agricultural products through community supported agriculture (CSA), farmers markets, implementation of innovative nutrient management, and alternative energy. Continued support to education and community building programs such as *The Harvest Festival* and similar programs. Continued support of eco-friendly agricultural labeling programs such as "Salmon-Safe", and King County Agricultural Initiatives, and continued support of local initiatives such as *Farming and the Environment*, and the *Cascade Harvest Coalition*.

Priority Three (P3): Extending the District Mission through Strategic Partnerships.

The District will utilize assessment funds to provide programs, services, and grants to landowners, member jurisdictions, WRIA Forums, and other community organizations, to extend the District's mission by leveraging strategic partnerships. This will happen through existing programs and partnerships as well as through new partnerships being developed.

Partnering for Community Based Stewardship. At the core of its mission, partnering with individual landowners and communities of landowners are where conservation districts create the most value. By working with others, the conservation district protects and enhances the environment now and for future generations. Programs and projects targeted at communities, watersheds, and sub-basins, can significantly improve the environmental and economic sustainability of the targeted area.

Partnering for Puget Sound Recovery. The District is uniquely positioned to play an important role in the recovery of Puget Sound. With the completion of the *Puget Sound Partnership's Action Agenda*, a number of actions were identified, which are ideally suited to the conservation districts surrounding the Puget Sound, many that must be accomplished with and through the cooperators of conservation district, landowners themselves. The engagement of private landowners and managers in voluntary conservation is a necessary component for successful Puget Sound Recovery. In addition to watershed recovery and salmon recovery efforts, which were also identified in the *Action Agenda*, and already being addressed by the District, additional community based stewardship, conservation projects, and other landowner engagement actions have been identified, for which the District is ideally suited to partner in these efforts, with the Puget Sound Partnership, as well as with landowners, other agency partners, and non-governmental organizations and community groups.

District programs, in addition to watershed recovery efforts, include community based conservation initiatives with a focus on site specific natural resource planning,

Partnering for Watershed Recovery. Watershed recovery, and related salmon recovery efforts have been an emphasis of the District for nearly ten years. The District was instrumental in providing support to community building in the development of *Watershed / Salmon Recovery Plans* in WRIA 7, WRIA 8, and WRIA 9. The District has provided funding for the implementation of those Salmon Recovery Plans as part of its WRIA/Member Jurisdiction Grants Program; in addition to appropriating assessment funding, the District has provided additional programs and services in support of these salmon recovery efforts in the completion of these plans, including the King Conservation District - Snoqualmie Watershed Opportunity Fund, the King Conservation District - WRIA 9 Watershed Forum *Shared Endeavor*³, the King Conservation District - *Marine Shoreline Program*, and other programs and services directed to the restoration of King County's three major watersheds and many sub-basins. The District will continue to support the completion of these plans, as an important part of regional natural resource conservation efforts.

Partnering with Member Jurisdictions. The District will continue to work with member jurisdictions, through its programs, services, and grants. In addition to King County, there are 34 Member Jurisdictions inside the boundaries of the District with which the District works together to accomplish conservation. Whether it is funding through one of the District grants programs, or technical services and contracted services, the District's annual work plan will continue to include programs and services that support our partnering member jurisdictions.

Board of Supervisors, the Executive, General District Administration, and District Communications. For the purposes of the Proposed Assessment Appropriations Budget for 2010, below, these program groups are combined under District Administration.

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ASSESSMENT APPROPRIATION PLAN FOR 2010-2014

Below is the Projected Assessment Revenue and appropriation of those revenue funds for Fiscal Year 2010. Projected revenue amounts, and proposed appropriations, will be used in the development of the District's Annual Work Plan and Budget, which is developed in the summer and autumn of each year, and adopted prior to the beginning of the upcoming fiscal year. The District Executive transmits this Proposed Annual Work Plan and Budget to the Board of Supervisors during the first week of October. The projected assessment revenue and proposed assessment appropriations budget for each year of the assessment provides the framework for the development of the Annual Work Plan and Budget, which is adopted later in the year. During the course of 2010-2014 assessment, the District will develop subsequent Assessment Appropriations Budgets and Annual Work Plans and Budgets consistent with the adopted Assessment Appropriation Plan. The District reserves the right to provide supplemental or amended Assessment Appropriations Budgets, in the event that during the Annual Work Plan and Budget development process, amendments are required on account of changes to the programs, project, or services, to be performed or supported by the District.

PROJECTED ASSESSMENT REVENUE 2010

Revenue generated from 2010 assessments will be remitted by the King County Assessor to the District after deducting a 1% assessor's fee⁵. Interest accrued on assessment collections will, be utilized by the District to fund District operations.

In addition to annual reporting to King County, the District will continue to have a community stakeholder involvement, with a stakeholder group, to provide feedback and guidance on District programs, services, and projects. The stakeholder group will be populated with a broad cross-section of agencies, organizations, and individuals from across King County, with representation at the Board of Supervisors. Stakeholder advisors will continue to play a greater role in community feedback and involvement with the programs, services, projects, and activities of the District, providing two-way feedback between the District and the community it serves.
