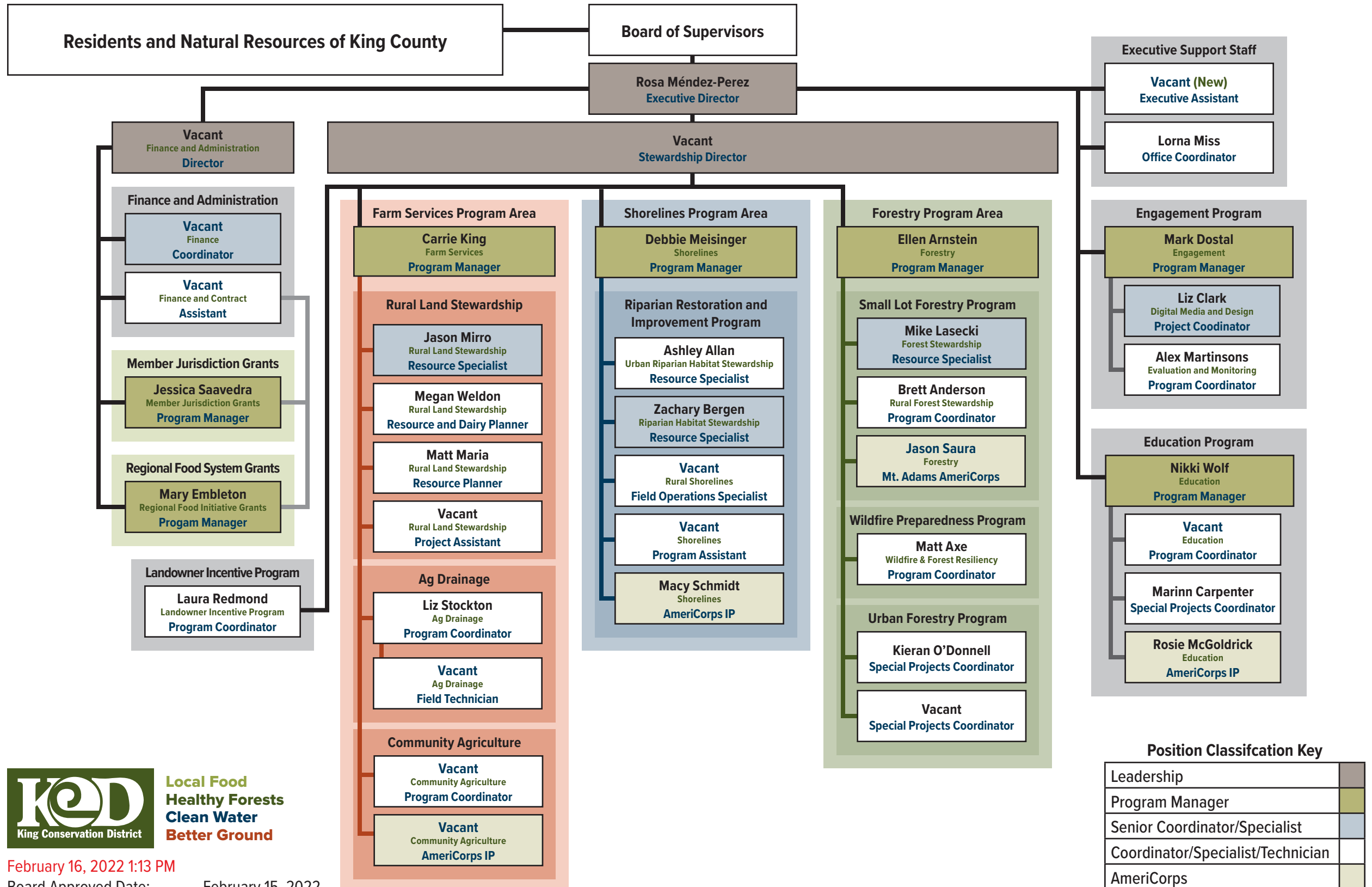

Other Considerations:

In general, there are no exemptions for the use of heavy machinery or in-channel work. This is standard and expected by KCD.

The review period typically varies from a couple of weeks to 3+ months.

Some of the permit fees listed above include processing fees (e.g. permit technology fees).

KCD Goals:

Collaborate with city staff and Advisory Committee members to streamline project review processes in cities identified as having higher barriers to project completion.

Work with all member jurisdictions and Advisory Committee members to streamline KCD voluntary riparian vegetation enhancement projects on private land and provide an efficient pathway through permit application processes and waive permit/project review fees.

Help identify barriers to private landowners wanting to perform voluntary riparian vegetation enhancement work on their own and work with member jurisdictions and the Advisory Committee to reduce these barriers for small scale, non-steep slope riparian planting projects involving manual weed control.

Please find below highlights of King Conservation District's April and May actions and program updates.

- Hiring
 - We are happy to introduce new members of our Finance team. Maria Chang-Ward joined us as Finance Coordinator on April 19th and Anastasia McDaniel joined us on May 2nd as our Finance and Contracts Assistant.
 - We also welcomed Maya Klem as Temporary Special Projects Coordinator with our Forestry Team on May 23rd and our new Community Agriculture Program Coordinator will begin with us in July.
 - We interviewed several candidates for Senior Director of Stewardship Programs and will be making an offer this week.
 - We did not receive many resumes for Director of Finance & Administration and redesigned the position to be more attractive to potential candidates and meet our current administrative needs. The role is now reposted under the title Chief Administrative Officer.
- Finance and Administration
 - Classification and Compensation Study – The study got under way in April with job questionnaires to all staff. The questionnaires are completed, and we are moving to the next phase with our consultant Compensation Connections, LLC reviewing the position descriptions and questionnaires to perform a comprehensive study.
 - Strategic Planning: Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion – We had a kick-off meeting on April 29th with the Athena Group and provided informational documents to the consultant such as prior long-range plans and the board's work on mission/purpose development with Third Sector. We also scheduled routine check-ins and a session to scope out the anonymous survey and define stakeholder groups. The next step will be sending out an anonymous survey to

our staff, board members, and advisory committee members. The goal of the surveys is to help us plan the focus of future workshops and trainings.

- We are continuing to develop new policies related to best practices for our accounts payable, receivables, and other areas of finance. Your packet included the most recent produced monthly statements.
- Program Updates
 - Riparian Stewardship: Planting season wrapped up in May. This winter and spring we planted 7.5 acres of buffer with 8,430 trees and shrubs along 2,760 linear feet of shoreline on properties in Covington, Renton and Seattle.
 - Nursery: We have also been working hard to make necessary improvements at the Wetland Plant Cooperative Nursery. The potting shed has been repaired, the remnants of the old tool shed have been removed and a new metal shipping container has been procured as a secure replacement for housing our tools and equipment. Spring tune-up of our irrigation system is underway as is our Special Use Permit from the Wastewater Treatment Plant that grants KCD use of the property as well as access to reclaimed water direct from the treatment plant at no cost. Our 2023 inventory is propagated and awaiting a long and sunny growing season and the remainder of the 2022 inventory will be made available for volunteers to trade in their volunteer hours and partner project donations.
 - Member Jurisdiction Grants: KCD-Seattle Community Partnership Program awarded \$761,000 to 13 Organizations. We also created a blog post and email to all 35 member jurisdictions to expand familiarity of the program.
 - This year's Regional Food System Grant Round will be accessible through KCD's online grant portal. Grant applications will be accepted beginning Monday, June 13, 2022. Grant applications will be due July 18, 2022. The grant funding limit increased to \$50,000.
 - Education Program: Education Team staff planned *Where the Water Begins* workshops for marine shoreline properties that took place in May and June, including in person workshops and beach tours. We are also having forestry tours in August and September. More information here: [Events : King Conservation District \(kingcd.org\)](https://kingcd.org/events/king-conservation-district)
 - Engagement: The Engagement team is working on supporting a number of program efforts through developing outreach materials and providing support to our upcoming Education Workshops, city-led tree give-aways, Trees for Rail second summer of outreach, Discovery Farms steering committee recruitment, and will be tabling at the King County Fair this summer.

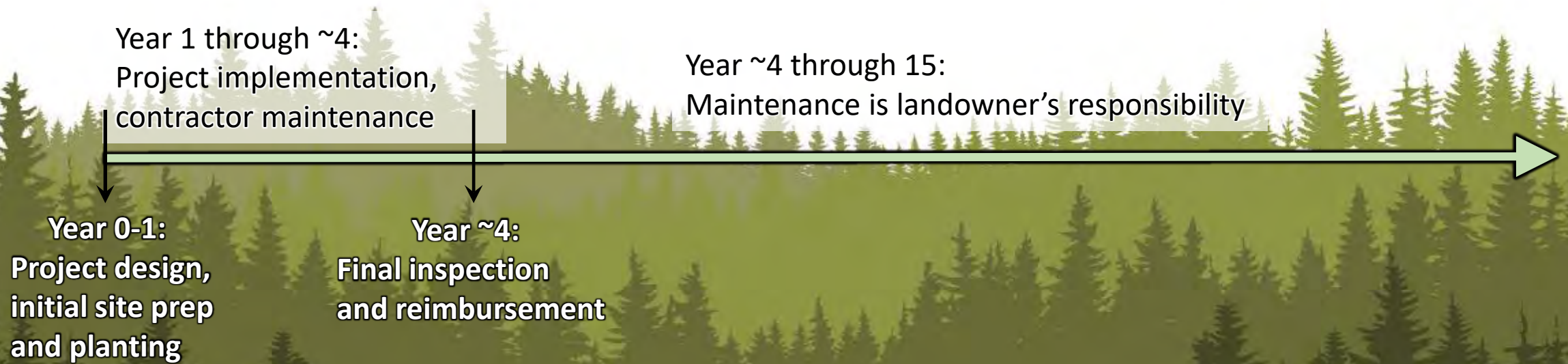

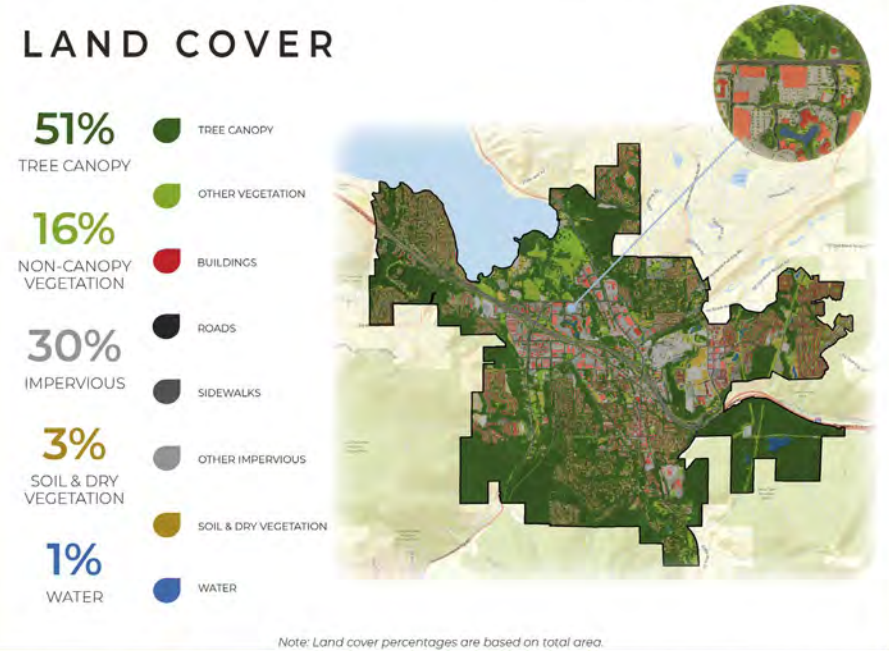


ISSAQUAH, WASHINGTON

TREE CANOPY ASSESSMENT



The urban forest in Issaquah is a valuable asset that provides residents and visitors with many ecological, environmental, and community benefits. This assessment analyzed the City's urban tree canopy (UTC), possible planting area (PPA), and change in UTC over a 6-year period. The results provide an updated baseline to develop strategies to protect and expand Issaquah's trees and natural areas during planning and development. The maps and project report help to concentrate efforts in areas where needs are greatest, tree planting space is available, and benefits can be realized.

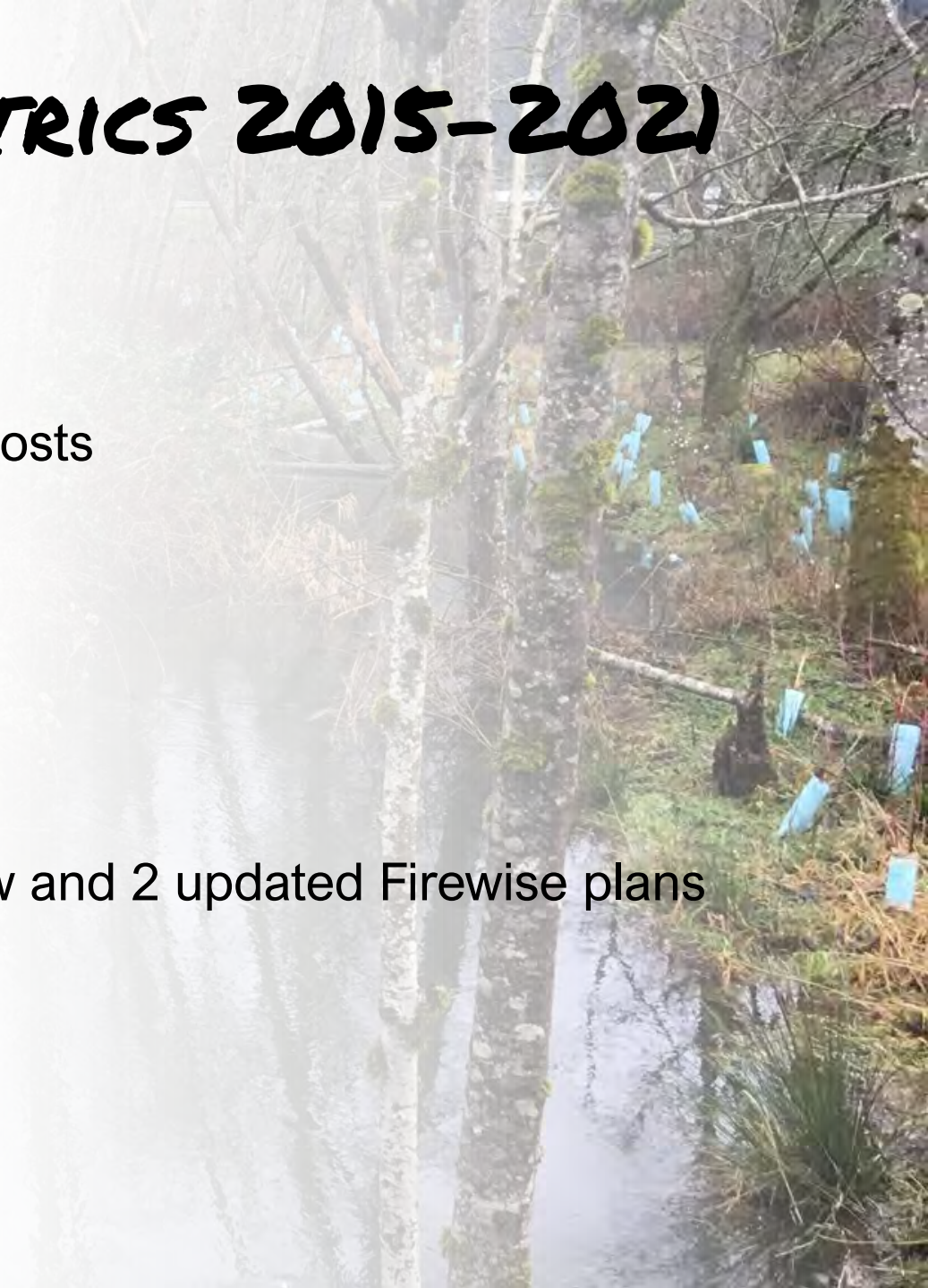

King Conservation District Seattle Community Partnership Programs Awards \$761,000 to 13 Organizations

[King Conservation District \(KCD\)](#) and [OSE](#) are continuing their longstanding collaboration to invest in natural resource improvements that are led by or in deep partnership with Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) communities.

KCD received 35 applications from amazing community organizations requesting over \$2.4 million dollars in funding. The program had \$761,000 available to award this year and selected 13 organizations. Proposed projects represented a range of activities and ideas including community education and empowerment, green career pathways, youth leadership, food justice, habitat conservation, composting and soil health, urban forest restoration, watershed health, and many more.

The focus of this funding opportunity and the 2022 awards continues to be investments in natural resource improvements that are co-created, led by, or in deep partnership with communities disproportionately impacted by environmental injustice, climate change, and systematic racism: Black, Indigenous, People of Color, immigrants, refugees, people with low incomes, youth and elders.
